

Letter From Brown Henley

Dear Sir: This letter is in reply to your letter of July 7-22 I beg to inform you that my son, Thomas Henley was stolen from my house on Feb 5, 1922 and took and put him in the county jail and got him scared and then went to work to make him out crazy. A person may act insane and not be insane. The court cannot hold a person upon an illegal process. Therefore his rights could not be in the court's power. When my son was sick he was in my care, when he was well he was in his own care. It is up to you and the court to prove that you have a legal right to my son. I go where I find my property and there I recover it by legal process. My letters are not improper. They are not sent to injure you nor to injure my son neither. You have my son confused in your institution and it is my duty to inform you of the wrong that has been done. My son and family including myself and I consider it to proper to notify my son of the illegal position he is in.
